PURPOSE OF CHALLENGE:

To assess the contestant's ability to conduct carpentry tasks accurately, safely, and within an allotted period from a set of drawings.

SKILLS AND KNOWLEDGE TO BE TESTED:

- Ability to interpret and follow plans and specifications
- Ability to use appropriate hand and power tools safely, accurately and proficiently
- Ability to demonstrate an appropriate standard of proficiency

EQUIPMENT, TOOLS, MATERIALS TO BE PROVIDED BY COMMITTEE:

- Cordless Circular Saw
- Cordless Drill and Impact Driver
- Cordless Jig Saw
- 2 saw horses
- A step ladder will be available for use by each competitor

EQUIPMENT, TOOLS, MATERIALS TO BE SUPPLIED BY COMPETITOR:

Contestants must wear appropriate clothing and personal protective equipment at a minimum and at all times, CSA approved, safety boots, eye protection, and hearing protection. Equipment recommended but not limited to the following.

- Hammer
- Framing square
- Nail set
- Wood plane
- Measuring tape (metric/imp).
- Hand saw (8-10 ppi)
- Utility knife self retracting
- Calculator
- Chalk line
- Nail puller
- Sliding T-bevel
- Level 24" – 48"
- Wood chisels
- Robertson # 2 Screw driver
- Twist drill bits (up to 3/8")
- Sanding block
- Robertson # 2 screw driver bit
- Protractor
- Speed square

Space requirements limit competition to the first 8 entrance applications received.

NATIONAL COMPETITION ELIGIBILITY:

- A mark of **70% or higher** must be scored by the gold medalist in order to attend the National Skills Competition
