CONTEST NAME: Workplace Safety

CONTEST NO: 92

LEVEL: Secondary

CONTEST DEADLINES:

- Registration opens online through the Skills Canada Manitoba website on **Monday, February 7, 2022.**
- Friday, March 18, 2022 Competitor Registration Deadline
- Skills Canada Manitoba Competition to be held April 4 14, 2022
- Deadline for student's work to be submitted **April 12, 2022**
- Students work to be evaluated by April 14, 2022
- Results to be posted on the Skills Manitoba website and social media sites on **Wednesday, April 20, 2022**.
- There will be an **Orientation Session** prior to the competition. Details and time to be announced by the Provincial Technical Committee. Competitor and advisor attendance is mandatory.

The Workplace Safety Competition will be held on Monday, April 11, 2022.

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PURPOSE OF CHALLENGE:

- To test the participants' ability to recognize, assess and control hazards in the workplace.
- To test the participants' ability to communicate occupational safety and health information to others.
- To prepare participants' for Skills Manitoba Nationals.

SKILLS AND KNOWLEDGE TO BE TESTED:

Participants will be evaluated on their:

- · Knowledge of occupational safety and health principles.
- Ability to identify and assess workplace hazards and to recommend corrective action.
- Ability to communicate occupational safety and health information to others.

1. HAZARD IDENTIFICATION AND CONTROLS

Each participant will be provided with 10 photos to inspect workplace scenes to identify safety and health hazards. The hazards categories include:

- Biological
- Chemical
- Ergonomic
- Physical
- Psychosocial
- General safety hazards

The participants are to list 10 hazards found in the workplace scenes on the worksheet provided. They are then asked to identify:

- The potential harm (outcome) the hazard could cause if left uncorrected
- A control measure that can be used to mitigate the risk
- The control type as per the Hierarchy of Controls.

2. HAZARD CONTROL SEARCH

Each participant will observe a video of work being conducted. Using the worksheet provided, they will be required to describe:

- One hazard that has been successfully controlled
- The potential harm the hazard could cause if it had not been corrected The control measure
- Control type that was used (Hierarchy of Controls)

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TOOLBOX TALK

The participants are required to prepare a 3–5 minute safety related toolbox talk of their choice to the judges.

Participants will need to prepare for this in advance and will not be given time on the date of the competition.

During the presentation, no electronic/multi-media component is allowed.

Posters and/or presentation boards and small props are permitted.

The participant will be evaluated on:

- Presentation content
- Length of presentation
- Delivery and style of presentation

SAFETY RULES / REQUIREMENTS:

The health, safety and welfare of all individuals involved with Skills Canada Manitoba are of vital importance.

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Submissions will not be judged if the completed Safety Checklist in not included in the submission.

SPECIAL CONDITIONS / ADDITIONAL INFORMATION:

Ethical Conduct: We recognize that participants will be competing individually in their own schools and therefore not all conditions can be monitored. However, we expect all competitors to compete fairly, respecting and abiding by the established rules in the true spirit of Skills Canada Manitoba.

Supervision of Competitor: Competitors will be required to have an adult with them that is qualified /competent in the contest area, to both supervise and ensure safety.

NATIONAL COMPETITION ELIGIBILITY:

A mark of **70% or higher** must be scored by the gold medalist in each contest in order for them to attend the National Skills Competition

THE IMPORTANCE OF ESSENTIAL SKILLS FOR CAREERS IN THE SKILLED TRADES;

Essential skills are used in nearly every job and at different levels of complexity. They provide the foundation for learning all other skills and enable people to evolve with their jobs and adapt to workplace change. Good Essential Skills means you will understand and remember concepts introduced in technical training. The level of Essential Skills required for most trades is as high as or higher than it is for many office jobs.

The following 9 skills have been identified and validated as key essential skills for the workplace:

Numeracy, Oral Communication, Working with Others, Continuous Learning, Reading Text, Writing, Thinking, Document Use, Digital.

Essential Skills Required for Workplace Safety: Oral Communication, Working with Others, Continuous Learning, Reading Text, Writing, Critical Thinking, and Document Use.
